### THANK YOU FOR HELPING OUR COMMUNITY'S WILDLIFE!

#### What happens now?

**1)** Trained GHS staff members assess the animal (when necessary with advice from a licensed wildlife rehabilitator) to evaluate their condition and determine if the animal is a candidate for rehabilitation.

**2)** If the animal is a good candidate for rehabilitation, GHS staff will provide stabilizing care and treatment including rehydration, pain medication and antibiotics.

**3)** GHS will arrange to transfer the animal to a licensed wildlife rehabilitator.

4) Volunteer Drivers deliver the animal to the wildlife rehabilitator.



**5)** The wildlife rehabilitator will assume care of the animal. Decisions involving the treatment plan and their future release into the wild is decided upon by the rehabilitator.

Many wild animals that come into our care have very serious injuries or may be very sick. If it is determined that an animal is not a good candidate for rehabilitation (ie: too injured or ill to recover, or no licensed rehabilitator has capacity to take over their care) GHS provides humane euthanasia at a veterinary clinic to ensure that the animal receives the most compassionate and humane end to its suffering.
