



'Happy Tails Begins Here' GHS Kennel Adoption

INSPIRED BY A LIFELONG LOVE OF ANIMALS: MARLENA & RALPH BLACKMAN

Ralph grew up with an abundance of pet companions and a family commitment to his local SPCA. Marlena did not grow up in a family with pets, other than a Budgie, but she always had a great love of animals. When they met and got married, one of the first decisions they made together was about finding a pet companion. They chose to look at their local SPCA in Regina, where they met

and fell in love with a Spaniel/Terrier puppy named Firkin. Firkin became a vital part of their lives for the next 18 years.

Over the years, Marlena and Ralph added Sufi, a Siberian Husky, and later Ariel. "Ariel was not much of a looker when we first met him at five-weeks old in the shelter, but he turned out to be a beautiful Belgian Malinois," shares Ralph. He remembers fondly how the Chicago Police canine unit [the city they lived in at the time] would often cruise by their home to admire him and tease Marlena and Ralph that they would love to "recruit" him to be part of their team.

After the Blackman's moved to Guelph, Ariel died. "We found our way to the Guelph Humane Society (GHS) where Willow, an American Cocker Spaniel, was waiting for us to adopt her. That was 12 years ago and the beginning of our relationship with GHS," shares Marlena.

Later, on an extremely cold February night in 2015, Marlena and Willow were out for their nightly walk. They discovered a freezing cat who was in desperate shape. They brought him to GHS and notified the team that if no one adopted him, they would.

"We were so impressed with the medical care and attention given to the cat, now known as Sage Melchior ("Mel" for short)," shares Marlena. "The updates we received during his recovery and the adoption process motivated us to join the Super Paws Club and become monthly donors."

Then, in 2021 inspired by their GHS pets, the Blackman's made a donation to adopt a 'Happy Tails Begin Here' Kennel and named it in honour of Willow and Sage Melchior. The donation would support animal care at GHS while animals waited for their Happy Tail.

"The experience of walking into a shelter and falling in love with a pet is one I will never forget" said Marlena. "It is meaningful to know our gift will support a place where future families will be built, and similar connections will be made." •

GHS ADOPTIONS UPDATE

It's been a busy adoption season for the team at GHS. From the beginning of May through to the end of August we created 341 Happy Tails, a **7.6% increase** over 2022.

Adoptions include 230 cats (8 seniors, 125 kittens and 7 barn cats); 45 dogs; 58 small animals (including 20 guinea pigs and 9 rabbits); 1 farm animal: and 7 birds.

The highlight was when 54 kittens - and the mother of one of the litters arrived at one time from the Windsor/Essex County Humane Society. GHS is part of a network of humane societies that offer reciprocal support to assist with overpopulation of animals in Southern Ontario.

It's been a **WILD SUMMER**

Our Wildlife Program received more than 1.200 calls between May and August this summer. The GHS team assessed and delivered essential short-term shelter and care to more than 55 different species of sick, injured or orphaned wildlife. The top four intakes included 254 cottontail rabbits, 166 grey squirrels, 124 American robins and 63 Canadian geese. With the help of our volunteer wildlife drivers, we provided safe transportation to our licensed wildlife rehabilitation centre partners for long-term care. Spud was found alone, lying in the gravel beside the road. Luckily, he was brought to the Guelph Humane Society by a kind stranger—no one came to claim him.

The world can be a scary and dangerous place for a young kitten. At just four-weeks old he was tired, hungry, and dehydrated. He had discharge coming from his nose and eyes that was so severe, he couldn't see or smell. The veterinarian on his case diagnosed him with an Upper Respiratory Infection (URI).

"URI is very common in cats, but the infection can put a young kitten's health at high-risk," says Samantha Westphal, GHS Animal Care Manager. "If left untreated the infection can progress quite quickly, and in fragile young kittens like Spud, it can even lead to death."

Unfortunately, Spud did not respond to his treatment. The infection spread to both of his eyes causing them to rupture. Spud's infection advanced quickly, causing him great pain. The only way to give him relief was to remove both of his eyes; he would live his life without sight.

"Kittens living with blindness can have full and wonderful lives," says Westphal. "They adapt quite well to their environment by using other senses such as smell and hearing. We knew this would be the best path forward for our little Spud."

Spud recovered from his surgery in foster care. With slow introductions he became comfortable with other cats and dogs in the home. He learned to rely on his other senses to find and play with his favourite toy and his foster even taught him the word 'touch' before petting him to ensure he would not be startled by human touch.

Thanks to our supporters, Spud received the care he needed. He was adopted in August and is now living his Happy Tail with his new family. **

This summer GHS launched its inaugural Cutest Pet Photo Contest. This year's contest raised more than \$14,500 to help Guelph and Wellington animals with nowhere else to turn.
